

Dear Mr. Evans,

I am writing this on behalf of our past Secretary, Mr. James Tierney, of the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter SPENCER Assn., with whom you had previous correspondence regarding your article, "THE NEW CENTURY" (apprx 1998) in which the Cutter SPENCER was featured, in an action photo, in the sinking of a German submarine on April 17, 1943 in the North Atlantic.

I wish to inform you that on this Saturday, Sept. 27th, at 10AM, a dedication ceremony for the original SPENCER MAST is being held at the Coast Guard Recruit Training Center ('Boot Camp') at Cape May, NJ. The MAST has been re-installed in close proximity to the Memorial of the Coast Guard's ONLY Medal of Honor recipient, Mr. Douglas Munro, who was killed in action while saving the lives of 500 Marines at Guadalcanal. (Doug Munro's first assignment, as well as 'boot camp', was on the SPENCER, prior to this country's entry into WW2).

I send this information in case you would have any interest in this event. The ceremony at 10AM is open to all interested persons. The attached photo shows the site of the recently installed MAST with the Munro Memorial to the forward. You can contact me direct if you

desire any further information regarding the activities.

By the way, Mr. Tierney still lives in Connecticut and sends his Best Regards to you! He will be attending the ceremony on Saturday.

Thank you for your time and consideration and especially for your past interest in Coast Guard history.

Received Letter from Herman Arond, former VWOA Director and long time VWOA Treasurer and now retired to Snug Harbor.

Dear Frank: Thanks very much for the VWOA

Newsletter. I enjoy reading them, especially
the last one #40. I'll get to that later.

Everthing here is going along fine. This Kid will be 85 this next Saturday. WOW! I'm not cheering until I actually make it.

Concerning the Andrea Doria/Stockholm "incident" I remember it clearly. I was asore at the time and followed it in detail — especially the court hearings in N.Y. — followed in detail in the NY Times.

One thing that was barely mentioned in the reports was the first ship at the scene for rescue purposes was the United Fruit Co. small freighter "Cape Ann". She was the 1st ship to take off survivors — 150 passengers from the Andrea Doria. The "Ile de France" came along soon after and took off something like 700 survivors and it received most of the publicity. And of course there were other ships involved.

I know about the Cape Ann because the Radio Officer on there was Charles Failla. After the "incident", he switched over to Grace Line and he and I were on the same ship for 6 weeks.

A side line note — Charley told me he called Italian Line to make a reservation to Italy, he mentioned his role in the Andrea Doria/Stockholm collision, and he was given a free round trip ticket.

Concerning the collision — both ships were going full speed in thick fog. The Andrea Doria tried to make a starboard/starboard passage with the Stockholm, and the Stockholm tried to make the customary port/port passage, therefore "BINGO". The Stockholm rammed the Andrea Doria.

The collision case was heard in U.S. Dictrict Court in NY, as a neutral place. The NY Times gave full coverage. Suddenly there was no more coverage, and there was an out of Court settlement. The papers said it was probably to limit liability. I'm glad I was in NY at the time. I found it interesting following the proceedings.

Concerning Cy Brill — he eventually became Manager of WSL, Mackay Radio, Amagansett Marine Coastal Station. From what I heard,

when the station closed, he shipped out. That's the end of my knowledge.

Everything is going OK. Sorry I'm unable to make trips to New York.





## COAST GUARD HONORS HERO, DEDICATES MAST

**CAPE MAY, N.J.** - Coast Guard Training Center Cape May will honor Signalman First Class Douglas Munro and dedicate the Coast Guard Cutter Spencer's mast in a ceremony here on the training center's parade field Sept. 27, 2008 at 10 a.m.

Munro, the only Coast Guard Medal of Honor recipient, served aboard the Spencer. He was killed in action while protecting U.S. Marines at Guadalcanal during World War II and Sept. 27, 2008 will mark the 66th anniversary of his heroic actions.

The Coast Guard Cutter Spencer W-36 was commissioned in 1937, and was used as a search and rescue platform primarily patrolling Alaskan waters. In WWII under the U.S. Navy, the Spencer saw significant combat action in both the Atlantic and Pacific theaters. In the Battle of the Atlantic, the cutter acted as a convey escort and hunted German submarines, sinking the U-225 and the U-175. In late 1944, Spencer reported to the Navy's Seventh (Pacific) Fleet as a Communications Command Ship. There Spencer participated in numerous amphibious invasions including Luzon and Palawan in the Philippines. After the war, Spencer returned to Coast Guard

In January 1969, Spencer returned to combat duty off the coast of Vietnam. In November 1969, Spencer returned to the United States to continue peacetime missions. Spencer served the nation for more than 37 years and when decommissioned in 1974, the Spencer was the most decorated cutter in the Coast Guard's fleet.

After the Spencer was decommissioned the Spencer mast was displayed at the entrance of the Intrepid Museum in New York City. Years later, the Coast Guard regained ownership of the mast
